

RE: Jesus' Sacrifice

Week 1

WALT: explore what happened in Holy Week.

Holy Week is the week leading up to Easter. During this time, Christians remember the last week of Jesus' life. Holy Week begins on Palm Sunday.



Palm Sunday

On this day, Jesus arrived to Jerusalem on a donkey through a cheering crowd. The disciples brought the donkey to Jesus and spread their cloaks over its back for him to sit on. As Jesus approached Jerusalem, crowds gathered, waving palm branches and shouting "Hosanna!" The people were very pleased to see him.

Maundy Thursday

Maundy Thursday is the Thursday before Easter. Christians remember it as the day of the **Last Supper**. Jesus asked the 12 disciples to prepare the meal. Jesus washed the feet of his disciples to show them he was humble and here to help. After the meal, Jesus and his disciples went to the Garden of Gethsemane. Jesus went to pray on the Mount of Olives. He asked the disciples to keep watch for him, but they fell asleep.

Good Friday

Good Friday is the Friday before Easter. This is the day Jesus was crucified. In the morning, Jesus was arrested. His disciples ran away because they were scared. Jesus did nothing wrong but the soldiers took him away to be crucified. He died later that evening. His body was placed in the temple.

Easter Sunday

On the Sunday morning, two women went to the tomb. When they arrived, they saw that the stone had been rolled away and an angel was there. The women were overjoyed and ran to tell the disciples what had happened.

Task

After reading the information about Holy Week, create a story board to represent the events which happened. Make sure they are in chronological order.
