A question sentence

An exclamation sentence

What a nice dog that is!

A statement sentence

It is sunny today.



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# Statement sentences



It is sunny today.

Statement sentences are sentences that tell us something.

They give us facts or ideas. They also tell us what is happening or what someone or something is doing or feeling.

They usually end with **a full stop**.



# Statement sentences

It is sunny today.

James plays tennis.

I like chocolate cake.

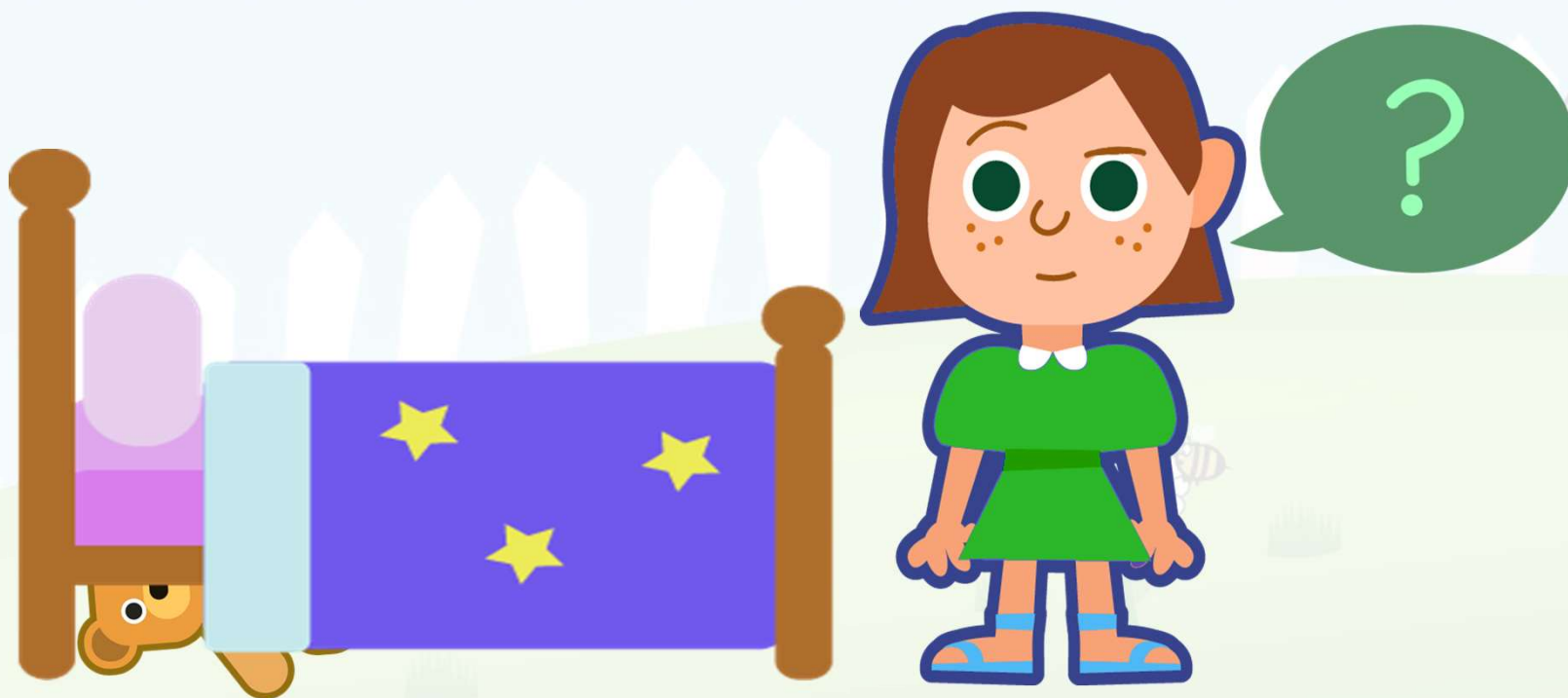
England's capital city is London.

ideas.

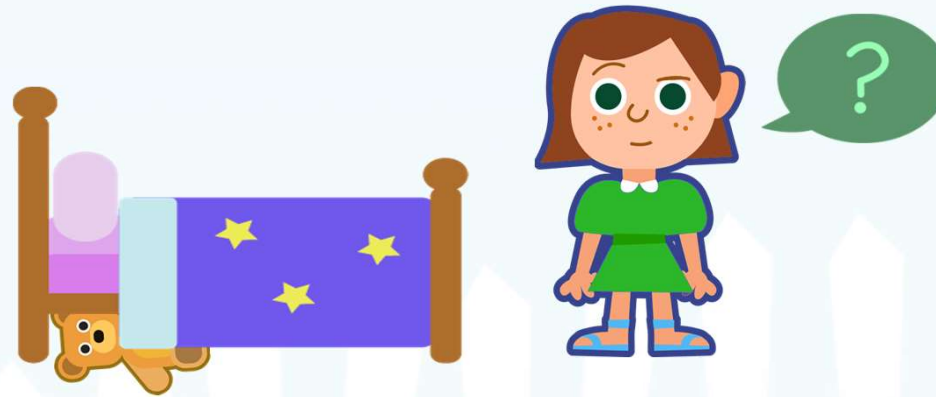

Sentences that **ask** something are called **question sentences**.

We use these sentences to find out more about something.

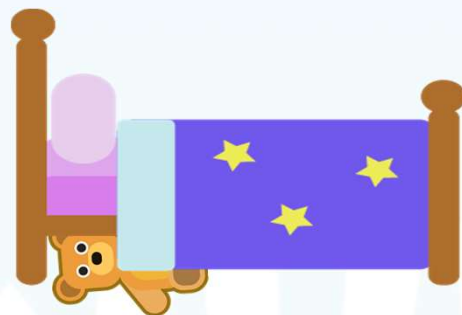
# Question sentences

Where is my teddy?

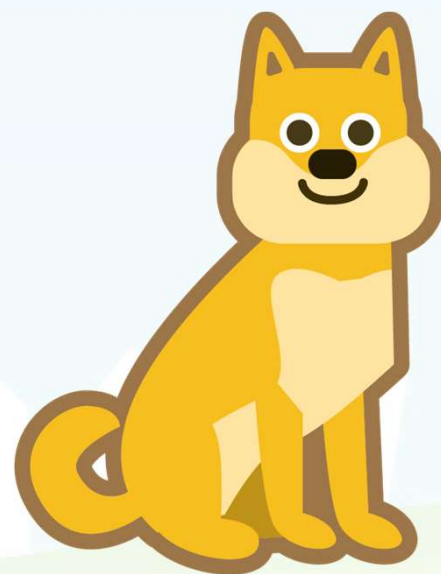
How many question sentences can you think of?

# Exclamation sentences



What a nice dog that is!



Sentences that show that someone is surprised, excited, shocked or has a strong emotion are called **exclamation sentences**.



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# Exclamation sentences



What a nice dog that is!

They often begin with 'how' or 'what', **but they do not ask a question.**

They end with an exclamation mark.
