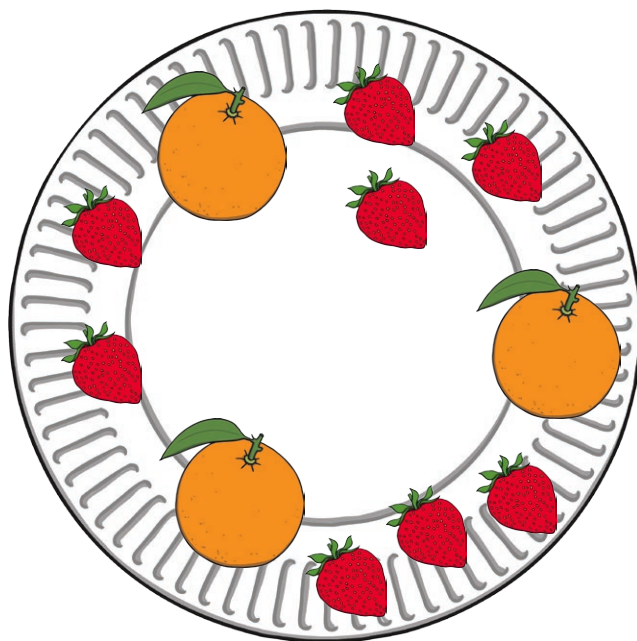

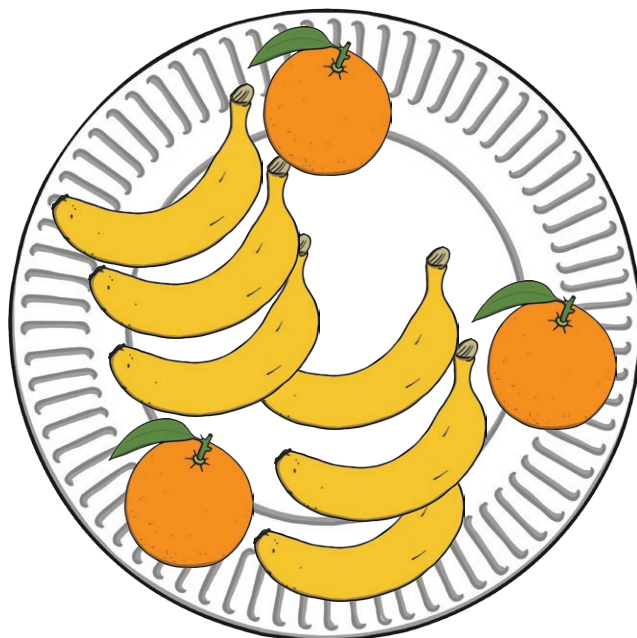

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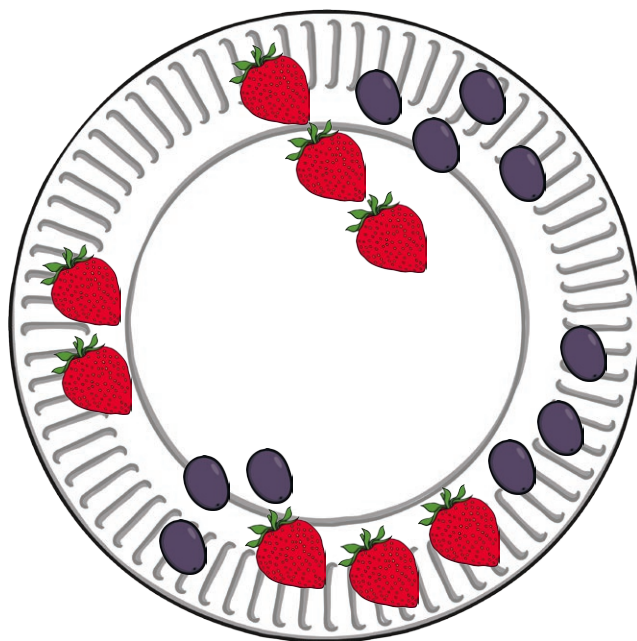

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Questions to Extend and Deepen Understanding

While the children are completing the challenge, you may like to ask them the following:

- I think there are more strawberries on the plate than grapes. Am I correct? Prove it!
- Can you tell me a sentence about the fruit on the plate? Can you use the words 'more' and 'fewer'?
- How do you know there are more bananas than oranges?
- Why do you think there are more strawberries than oranges?
- Are there fewer oranges than grapes? How could you check?

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Challenge Set-Up Instructions

1. Print the Comparing Fruit Poster. Alternatively, you may wish to place some real or role-play fruit on to a large paper plate or tray for the children to look at. You will need 3 oranges, 8 strawberries, 6 bananas and 10 grapes.
2. Place the challenge cards in an area for children to use alongside the Comparing Fruit Poster or the role-play food.
3. When working with the children, you may wish to use the suggested questions to extend and deepen their understanding of comparing quantities.
